




Flour Babies by Anne Fine





Once by Morris Gleitzman





When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit by Judith Kerr





Young Willie Beech is evacuated to the country as Britain stands on the brink of WW2. A sad, deprived child, he slowly begins to flourish under the care of old Tom Oakley - but his new-found happiness is shattered by a summons from his mum back in London.

War Horse by Michael Morpurgo



'War Horse' is the story of Joey, a thoroughbred horse, and how he is forced into the thick of the harrowing, poorly-led battles of the First World War.

Seeker by William Nicholson



People said Nomana Warriors had magic powers. They carried no weapons, wore no armour, they had no need. They were the Noble Warriors of the true way, and no one could stand against them, until Seeker. All his life he yearned to join the Nomana to fight alongside them, and to find glory. Truckers by Terry Pratchett

The Lightning Thief by Rick Riordan





Small Steps by Louis Sachar



Three years after being released from Camp Green Lake, Armpit is trying hard to keep his life on track, but when his old pal X-Ray shows up with a tempting plan to make some easy money scalping concert tickets, Armpit reluctantly goes along.

Vicky's Angel by Jacqueline Wilson



Jade is so used to being with and agreeing with Vicky, her best friend, that when a tragic accident occurs, she can hardly believe that Vicky's no longer there. But Vicky is not going to let being dead stop her from enjoying life to the full.

Book Thief by Markus Zusak



Narrated in the all-knowing matter-of-fact voice of Death, witnessing the story of the citizens of Molching. By 1943, the Allied bombs are falling, and the sirens begin to wail. Liesel shares out her books in the air-raid shelters. But one day, the wail of the sirens comes too late.
